



Passages Through the Archives: Midnight of Noon



From the darkest night may come the brightest light. *Passages Through the Archives* features manuscripts, artifacts, video, and artwork from the Archives exploring psychological experiences of utter pain, ecstatic revival, and how these two extreme and uncanny hours of the soul both eclipse and catalyze one another.

Passages Through the Archives: Midnight of Noon (part two) is now on view and runs through November. It follows midnight into the long-awaited or spontaneous experience of noon, often imagined as a heightened moment of sacred union. Items in this exhibit present investigations and visions of rebirth, synchronicity, spirituality, parapsychology, and mythic figures embodying the transcendent emergence of life from death.

The Rare Books of William Henry Barnes



OPUS' new exhibit, *Midnight of Noon*, features the unique and seldom seen rare book collection of Judge William Henry Barnes. Judge Barnes' collection includes over eighty books on esoteric spiritualism from the late 19th and early 20th centuries, a thriving period of public interest in spirituality and the occult. Among the books on view are those pictured here: *The Spirit World* by Mrs. M.T. Longley published in 1908 and *Are the Dead Alive?* by Fremont Rider published in 1909.
