

2020 Christine Downing Dissertation Fellow


We are pleased to announce that James Perrin has been awarded the 2020 Christine Downing Dissertation Fellowship.

James will receive \$5,000 to support research for his dissertation titled *The Animum:* Queering Jungian & Post-Jungian Anima / Animus Theories. This study seeks to craft a new anima/animus theory that is "fully rainbow compatible," by examining Jungian, post-Jungian, and queer theories, elaborating the meta-theoretical tensions and structures both within and between them that create the apparent contradictions in the

areas of sex, gender, and sexuality, thus allowing a union of those fields' structuralist and post-structuralist epistemologies.

Collection Spotlight

Eranos Yearbooks and Lectures of James Hillman



While missing the inspiration and camaraderie of gathering together in person, we cast our spotlight on what is available to us from gatherings of the past, particularly the legendary Eranos Conferences in Ascona, Switzerland.

Since 1933, international, cross-disciplinary thinkers have converged at Casa Eranos to share contributions exploring diverse archetypal dimensions of human experience. Among the many luminaries to grace these gatherings are C. G. Jung, Marie-Louise von Franz, Martin Buber, Mircea Eliade, D. T. Suzuki, and OPUS' own Joseph Campbell and James Hillman.

Hillman delivered his first lecture in 1966 with "On Psychological Creativity" and went on to deliver 14 more lectures through 1987. Several of his Eranos contributions grew into larger publications (*The Dream and the Underworld*, *The Thought of the Heart*) or live on in his Uniform Edition collected works (such as "Senex and Puer," "The Imagination of Air and the Collapse of Alchemy," and "Oedipus Revisited").



OPUS holds offprints of Hillman's *Eranos Jahrbuch* entries and the hard-worked drafts and research materials that went into creating these lectures. A set of Eranos Yearbooks, featuring multiple lectures presented at each conference, is also available.
