As we collectively find ourselves enduring an extraordinary time of what is normally a season of more intimate gathering and sharing, we at OPUS are always thinking of you and remain positive as we continue to look forward to re-opening, re-grouping, and re-imagining together in person again. Campus remains closed through the Winter academic session, but staff safely continues our work here and will be ready for your return.

Every two years the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) develops a list of anniversaries of historic events and of eminent personalities for celebration. For the 2020-2021 time period, UNESCO named Marija Gimbutas to their list in recognition of her upcoming 2021 centennial. To participate in honoring Gimbutas, we are busy finalizing the research and development of a new year-long exhibit, which begins January 23, 2021, the 100th anniversary of her birth. At that time, we will launch the exhibit in a virtual format that will be made available to all, and the physical exhibit will remain in place for anyone who visits once campus is open again. OPUS is proud to be able to share valuable materials from Gimbutas' mythology and archeology collection with you, especially in conjunction with UNESCO's stated interest in an international perspective of education, science, and culture and the distinction they have bestowed upon her.

A final reminder to students working on dissertations that the application deadline for the 2021 Christine Downing Dissertation Fellowship is Friday, January 15, 2021 at 5:00 p.m. The guidelines include an introductory statement about the Covid virus; please read and give careful consideration to this before beginning your application.

OPUS wishes to acknowledge the generous donation of funds received from the 2020 third-year Myth Cohort from Pacifica Graduate Institute. At their request, these funds have been designated for digitizing a selected portion of materials from the Chris Downing collection. Representatives from the Cohort and OPUS staff have developed a wish list of possible materials, and a deeper evaluation of preservation and use priorities from within the list will begin in early 2021. Our warmest thank you to the group for

thinking of OPUS and the Downing Collection, and for recognizing the ongoing need for preservation and extended access of fragile materials.

Willow Young, LMFT, a professor at Pacifica Graduate Institute, will be giving a Zoom talk presented by the C. G. Jung Club of Orange County on Sunday December 13. Her topic, "Eros and the Value of Relatedness: Jung and Ochwiay Biano and the Lineage of an Enduring Friendship", features an interview with Katie Sanford as well as other information gleaned during Professor Young's research in the Sanford Collection at OPUS. Marija Gimbutas Honoring 100 Years





New Year, New Exhibit

Marija Gimbutas: Archeomythology of a Goddess



In celebration of the centennial of Lithuanian-American archeologist, author, and UCLA Professor Emeritus Marija Gimbutas' birthdate and the UNESCO designated anniversary, OPUS presents the year-long exhibit, *Marija Gimbutas: Archeomythology of a Goddess*, featuring a variety of items from OPUS' collection illuminating the resilient and inspired life and equally distinguished and controversial work of the self-designated "archeomythologist" (1921-1994). On view are edited typescripts, notes, photographs, excavation maps, personal memorabilia, and archeological illustrations spanning from her early studies of Lithuanian folklore, to her groundbreaking "Kurgan hypothesis" regarding the transformation of Old European civilization, to her passionate and impactful theories on the sovereign worship of a multifaceted Mother Goddess in pre-patriarchal cultures.

This exhibit may be viewed throughout 2021, beginning virtually January 23, 2021 and physically on-site when campus reopens.
